THE MONTH OF APRIL - The Catholic Church dedicates this month to devotion to the Blessed Sacrament. The following beautiful prayer, *Anima Christi*, is often said after receiving Communion, and dates from the early 14th century. The prayer takes its name from its first two words in Latin. *Anima Christi* means "the soul of Christ." This translation is by Blessed John Henry Cardinal Newman.

*Soul of Christ, be my sanctification;
Body of Christ, be my salvation;
Blood of Christ, fill all my veins;
Water of Christ's side, wash out my stains;
Passion of Christ, my comfort be;
O good Jesus, listen to me;
In Thy wounds I fain would hide;
Ne'er to be parted from Thy side;
Guard me, should the foe assail me;
Call me when my life shall fail me;
Bid me come to Thee above,
With Thy saints to sing Thy love,
World without end. Amen.*

WHY PRAY FOR PRIESTS? As Father John Hardon, S.J., once said, "*praying and offering God sacrifices for the priesthood are indispensably important,*" because "*there is no Catholic Church without the priesthood.*" In administering the sacraments and serving us, priests act in persona Christi (that is to say, in the person of Christ). It is only our priests and bishops who can give us the sacraments, the foundations of Christ's Church and our faith. After acknowledging the lurid details of scandals involving clergy it's understandable that one may become disillusioned with the priesthood. But please remember the many faithful, holy priests and bishops who have been called by God out of the world for this unique vocation. As human beings, they need our prayers and support especially at his time.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS - Telling the story of the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus was an important part of the early Christian's experience. In the late fourth century, people began making pilgrimages to the Holy Land, where they would follow the path that Jesus took to Calvary. During the Middle Ages, when outbreaks of war made it impossible for people to travel to the Holy Land, people created a Via Dolorosa, or "Sorrowful Way," in their towns and villages. They erected paintings or sculptures depicting the Passion of Christ along a processional route or inside a church. By the mid-18th century, the number of stations was fixed at 14 and the devotion known as the Stations of the Cross, also called the Way of the Cross, became widespread. **JOIN US, every Friday of Lent as we pray the Stations of the Cross immediately following the 5:30 PM daily Mass.**

ALMSGIVING WITHOUT GIVING MONEY - The three pillars of the Catholic Lenten observance are Prayer, Penance (or Fasting) and Almsgiving. Found in scripture and in the writings of the Fathers of the Church, they express conversion in relation to God (prayer), to self (fasting), and to others (almsgiving). Almsgiving is not simply making donations to the poor. There are many more opportunities to fulfill this mandate of mercy and generosity. "Whatsoever you do to these least brothers of mine, you did for me." What you failed to do ...you failed to do for me. Here is a list of the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy: **The Corporal Works of Mercy are:** To feed the hungry; To give drink to the thirsty; To clothe the naked; To harbor the harborless; (shelter the homeless) To visit the sick; To ransom the captive; (visit the imprisoned) To bury the dead. **The Spiritual Works of Mercy are:** To instruct the ignorant; To counsel the doubtful; To admonish sinners; To bear wrongs patiently; To forgive offences willingly; To comfort the afflicted; To pray for the living and the dead. Giving money to help those in need is indeed almsgiving, but almsgiving does not have to involve money. May God bless the remainder of your Lent. (catholicaction.org)
